The Copenhagen talks left many questions unanswered about how the international community can collectively fight climate change. What is the appropriate mechanism to incentivize the private sector to invest in clean technologies? Is cap-and-trade the right strategy, or are carbon tariffs necessary? How can industrializing nations reduce emissions without hindering competitiveness?

Henry M. Paulson, Jr. is a committed environmentalist and firm believer in using price signals to stimulate environmentally sustainable industrial expansion. As U.S. Secretary of the Treasury, he incorporated environmental issues into the U.S. Strategic Economic Dialogue with China and supported the creation of a World Bank fund to promote affordable clean tech transfer to the developing world. Previously, he spent more than thirty years at Goldman Sachs, serving as Chairman and CEO from 1999 to 2006. On his watch, the firm became the first investment bank to adopt an Environmental Policy Framework. From 2004-2006, Secretary Paulson served as Chairman of The Nature Conservancy. He is currently a SAIS Distinguished Visiting Scholar and Fellow at the Bernard L. Schwartz Forum on Constructive Capitalism.
