About SAIS

THE PAUL H. NITZE School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) of The Johns Hopkins University in Washington, D.C., is one of the nation's leading graduate schools devoted to the study of international relations. In addition to its campus in Washington's Dupont Circle neighborhood, SAIS has two centers abroad—one in Bologna, Italy, and the other with Nanjing University in Nanjing, China. ● SAIS enrolls about 600 full-time students in Washington, with approximately 400 graduating each year from the two-year M.A. program in international relations. ● Courses at SAIS are multidisciplinary and offer both functional and regional studies. A one-year course of study leading to the Master of International Public Policy degree serves mid-career professionals in government and business. The school also accepts a small number of candidates in the Ph.D. program. ● SAIS conducts joint-degree programs with the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, the Tuck School of Business at Dartmouth College, the University of Virginia School of Law, Stanford University School of Law, The Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health and the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. ● Alumni are employed in a wide range of careers throughout the world, and more than 130 graduates have become ambassadors. The school consistently ranks as one of the top master's degree programs for those pursuing a policy career in international relations in the poll regularly reported by *Foreign Policy* magazine.

● Members of the institute include the entire SAIS faculty as well as research fellows from diverse backgrounds, such as the diplomatic corps, business, media, academia, the military and government. ● In an effort to encourage the interaction of all these groups, FPI hosts seminars, roundtables, study groups and conferences. The institute also sponsors research on current world problems and supports teaching in a variety of fields.

Opportunities for the Media: International Reporting Project

THE INTERNATIONAL REPORTING PROJECT at SAIS provides opportunities for U.S. journalists to study, travel and report on important international news stories. The project was established in 1998 and offers fellowships to early-career and mid-career U.S. journalists. IRP Fellows come to SAIS for seminars and classes before embarking on five-week reporting assignments overseas, followed by a final return stay at SAIS.

● The project awards Gatekeeper Editor Fellowships each year to senior editors and producers at U.S. news organizations to participate in fact-finding trips to countries in the news. IRP also sponsors panel discussions



and seminars on international media issues and organizes periodic conferences on international news coverage. ● Director of the project is John Schidlovsky (see page 95), a veteran international journalist who previously served as director of The Freedom Forum Asian Center in Hong Kong and was a reporter for 20 years, including stints as bureau chief for *The Baltimore Sun* in Beijing and New Delhi. ● More information about the International Reporting Project at SAIS is available at www.internationalreportingproject.org.

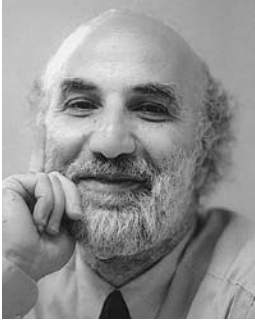

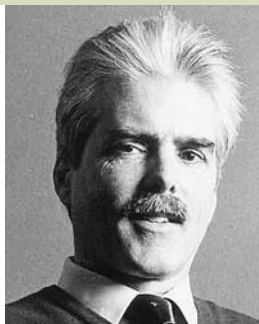

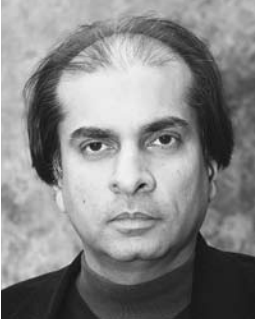
