MICHAEL VAN DUSEN '68, Ph.D. '71 received the 2008 Johns Hopkins University Alumni Association's Distinguished Alumnus Award on October 24. 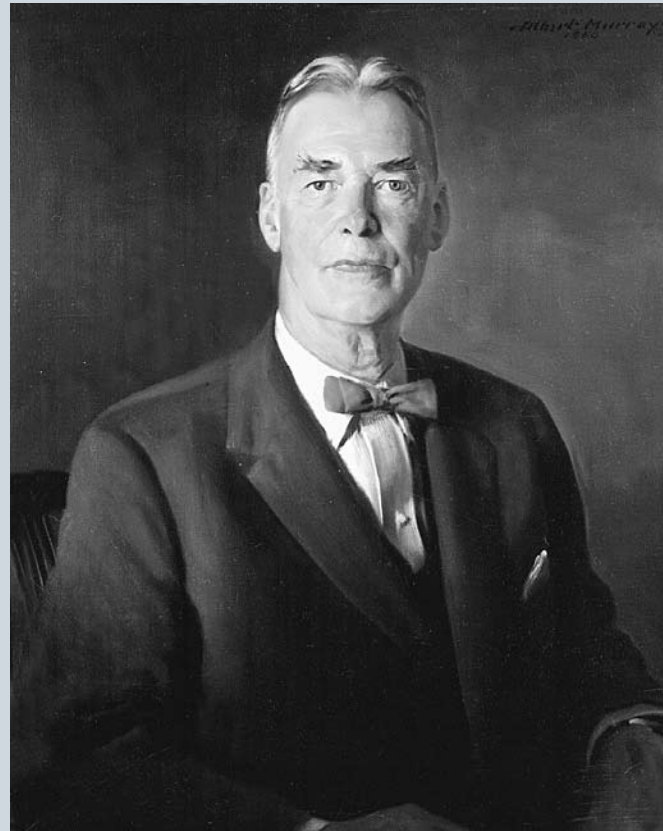
