**Energy, Resources and Environment
Resident Faculty Position for 2014-15**

The Hopkins-Nanjing Center for Chinese and American Studies (HNC) opened in 1986 in Nanjing, China, as a one-of-a-kind educational collaboration between the Johns Hopkins University and Nanjing University. For 27 years the HNC has been at the forefront of efforts to build ties between the United States and China. The Center has helped build a generation of leaders on both sides of the Pacific with a deep understanding of each other's history and culture. As one of the three locations of the School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), HNC is a highly selective graduate institution founded to provide a practical approach to training students in international leadership and foreign relations, and to provide educational opportunities for professionals already working on global issues.

The Position

HNC is seeking to fill a position of resident professor in Nanjing in a newly established concentration of Energy, Resources, and Environment (ERE). The ERE program is new for the Center and seeks to focus on teaching, research and policy analysis related to global energy issues, international resource management and environmental concerns. An economist with expertise in one of these areas is preferred. The position is open to all applicants in any of the three areas. The goal is to fill the position to begin fall semester 2014.

Qualifications

Applicants must have a Ph.D., a strong theoretical and methodological training, significant teaching experience, should provide evidence of scholarly productivity, and show a commitment to advancing cross-cultural dialogue and intellectual exchange in this unique, joint Sino-American residential graduate school. Applicants should be prepared to teach courses with an interest in current public policy issues related to energy, resources and/or the environment. International faculty teach in English and primarily teach Chinese M.A. degree-level students preparing for careers in international affairs. The course load is two courses each semester and M.A. thesis advising is required.

Applications will be reviewed beginning October 20, 2013 and will be accepted until a decision is made.
